"Lord, let me see again."

Reflections on Luke 18. 31 - 43

"Seeing" is an important category in the Gospel According to Luke and, indeed, the life of faith more generally. "See," Jesus says as he tells his disciples – for the third time! – about what awaits him in Jerusalem. But they don't see. In fact, Luke records, "they understood nothing."

But always sensitive in his depiction of the disciples, Luke lets us know that what Jesus said "was hidden from them."

It is no accident, then, that in the very next scene a blind man, calls out and begs Jesus to have mercy. He calls out fervently, desperately, with his whole heart. And Jesus, sensing his earnestness, stops and asks the simplest and perhaps most powerful question in Scripture: "What do you want me to do for you?" And the man answers in equally simple and potent words: "Lord, let me see again." And he does, as Jesus heals him and lets him know that his faith has restored him, healed him, made him whole, and saved him.

"Lord, let me see again." I wonder, at times, what would have happened if the disciples had made this request. What would have happened if they could have seen who lesus really was and understood his purpose and destiny.

We'll never know; they failed to ask. But we still can.

Pre-Lenten Season

As the Church moves through the Christian Year from Epiphany to Lent she passes through three Sundays, which hold strange titles for modern ears:

Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima are in fact three Latin words which indicate how far away we are from Easter – that is, 70, 60 and 50 days respectively. From the 5<sup>th</sup> century these Sundays emerged as a preparatory cycle for Lent.
