

Christmas at St. Thomas's Cathedral

I welcome you on this the most holiest of nights to the Cathedral Church of St. Thomas Apostle. You are here at one of Christianity's three most holy times (Easter and Pentecost being the others)—a day on which we give thanks for the coming among us of God in the life and witness of Jesus. Christmas is about what theologians call the Incarnation— the "enfleshment"—of God in us. God has become one of us in Jesus. From now on, we human beings and all that we are—our joys, our sorrows, our achievements, our losses—is blessed and transformed by God's healing and freeing love.

The waiting and watching of Advent is brought to fulfilment in the deepest part of the night. Mary brings to birth the newborn infant who is redeemer of all creation. The midnight service hallows the turning of the night to Christmas, and honours Jesus' birth in word and sacrament, carols and song.

"Remembering and telling the Christmas Story...."

We often use symbols that have lost their meaning, signs without an obvious sense.

Somewhere in the north of Holland there is a church where all those who entered used to bow down in the direction of a whitewashed part of the church wall before settling in the pews. Nobody knew why. They had been doing this from generation to generation, and no question was ever asked.

Then, one day, the parish council decided to clean the walls. While doing this, they discovered some traces of a painting under the whitewash on the wall. Very carefully they started to peel off the chalk, and they uncovered a centuries-old painting of Jesus on the cross.

Nobody remembered that picture. There was no description of it to be found: the painting had been lost from human memory. It must have been painted centuries before. But the sign of respect had remained. They finally knew why they were bowing their heads before sitting down. The sign had been there, but it's meaning was forgotten. Nobody knew the story of the origin of that sign, nobody could tell its tale.

Driving through the towns and villages during this Christmas night, one sees colourful lights everywhere. Driving like that, you will be driving alone, because everyone is at home, giving presents and gifts to one another, millions of them.

Those lights brightening up the darkness of our world, those gifts fulfilling so many wishes and desires, are obviously signs and symbols, too.

But who would understand them, if the Christmas story were not remembered and told?

The story about how they had been looking for him all through the ages. How even today so many are hoping for a redeemer. And how finally he came from God, God's gift to the world, a light brightening its darkness.

You should tell this story to yourself: How in your own world, which often seems so frustrating and lonely, new life was born. You should tell it to those around you, to give them the hope they need so very much. But you should especially tell it to your children, just as your parents told you the Christmas story.

It is the nicest story in the world, if you come to think of it, about God starting a new life in the midst of us. It is in this way that we can recapture the meaning of the lights we light in the night, of the gifts we give one another, fulfilling our desires.

That is why we have come here tonight, to start the new life he gave us.

Christmas is a time both for thanksgiving and renewal. As we gather in this beautiful Cathedral where worship has been offered for over 300 years, both our liturgy and our music remind us of how much we have to be thankful for and how God calls each one of us to be agents of love and healing in a broken world. We hope that you will find tonight's worship both soothing and stirring, and that you will leave here comforted and renewed in your commitment to love God by serving human beings created in God's image.

From all of us here at the Cathedral we wish you a blessed Christmas and a peaceful New Year.





The Lighting of the Christ Candle

The Advent wreath originally emerged as a devotional tool used in the home but eventually migrated into the church. It is a visual symbol that marks the progression of time in Advent.

On Christmas the Christ Candle is lit — as a symbol of the light of Christ, which cannot be held back by distance, which shines in each one of us, no matter where we are.

The Old Testament Reading

Isaiah 9. 2

This reading is typically from the Old Testament (Hebrew Scriptures) which Jesus knew and from which he often referred or quoted.

A reading from the prophesy of Isaiah.

THE people that walked in darkness have seen a great light: they that dwell in the land of the shadow of death, upon them hath the light shined. Thou hast multiplied the nation, Thou hast increased their joy: they joy before Thee according to the joy in harvest, and as men rejoice when they divide the spoil. For thou hast broken the yoke of his burden, and the staff of his shoulder, the rod of his oppressor as in the day of Midian. For all the armour of the armed man in the tumult and the garments rolled in blood, shall even be for burning, for fuel of fire. For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon His shoulder: and His name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace. Of the increase of His government and peace there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon His kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgement and with justice from hence- forth even for ever. The zeal of the Lord of hosts will perform this.

This reading, taken from the New Testament, is typically from a letter (epistle) to the early Church, the Acts of the Apostles, or the Revelation to John.

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Hebrews.

GOD who at sundry times and in divers manners spake in time past unto the fathers by the prophets, hath in these last days spoken unto us by His Son, whom He hath appointed heir of all things, by whom also He made the worlds; who being the brightness of His glory, and the express image of His person, and upholding all things by the word of His power, when He had by Himself purged our sins, sat down on the right hand of the Majesty on high; being made so much better than the angels, as He hath by inheritance obtained a more excellent name than they. For unto which of the angels said He at any time,

Thou art my Son,

This day have I begotten Thee?

And again,

I will be to Him a Father,

And He shall be to me a Son?

And again, when He bringeth in the first-begotten into the world, He saith,

And let all the angels of God worship Him.



The term "Gradual" comes from the Latin for "step".

Traditionally, this was a psalm sung by a solo cantor on the steps of an elevated platform.

The 'gradual hymn' moves us toward the summit of the Liturgy of the Word — the reading of the Holy Gospel.

Gospel means "good news" — specifically the "good news of Jesus."


Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

The word "creed" comes from the Latin "credo" for "I believe." First formulated at the Council of Nicaea in 325 A.D. and confirmed in 381 A.D., the Nicene Creed is said at the Holy Eucharist and reflects what Christians believe regarding the relationship between the Father, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit: The Holy Trinity.

I BELIEVE in one God the Father Almighty,

maker of heaven and earth, and of all things visible and invisible:

And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God,

begotten of His Father before all worlds,

God of God,

light of light,

very God of very God,

begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father,

through whom all things were made:

Who for us men, and for our salvation came down from heaven,

and was incarnate by the Holy Spirit of the Virgin Mary,

and was made man, and was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate. He suffered and was buried.

and the third day He rose again according to the Scriptures,

Seven days before Christmas Eve monasteries would sing the "O antiphons" in anticipation of Christmas Eve when the eighth antiphon, "O Virgo virginum" ("O Virgin of virgins") would be sung. An antiphon is a short verse that is used like a refrain. The Gospel canticle at Morning, Evening and Night Prayer has an antiphon at the beginning and the end. The Gospel canticle at Evening Prayer is the Magnificat, the Song of the Blessed Virgin Mary (Luke 1.46-55).



The Eucharistic Prayer

In the Great Thanksgiving, we do what Jesus himself asked us to do: thank God and recall all that God has done for us in the life, death, and resurrection of Christ. The Great Thanksgiving, or Eucharistic Prayer, is a long prayer with four parts. Each of these four parts corresponds to a different action of Jesus at the Last Supper, where he took, blessed, broke, and gave bread and wine as sacraments of his body and blood. We begin the Great Thanksgiving with the Sursum Corda, meaning "Lift up your hearts."

Celebrant All The Lord be with you;

And also with you. Lift up your hearts;

We lift them up to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to our Lord God;

It is right to give thanks and praise.

The Celebrant

IT is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times, and in all places, give thanks unto Thee, O Lord, Holy Father, Almighty, Everlasting God.

The Breaking of Bread

We recall God's acts of salvation history. The presider says the "Words of Institution" that Jesus said at the Last Supper. At the Memorial Acclamation we remember Christ's death, resurrection, and promise to return at the end of the age. During the prayer, the Holy Spirit is invoked to bless and sanctify the gifts of bread and wine.

The Celebrant

HOLY in truth art Thou, and blessed in truth,
O Almighty God, our heavenly Father,
for that Thou of Thy tender mercy didst give
Thine only Son Jesus Christ to take our nature upon Him,
and to suffer death upon the Cross for our redemption;
who made there, by His one oblation of Himself once offered,
a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction,
for the sins of the whole world;
and did institute, and in His holy Gospel command us to continue,
a perpetual memorial of that His precious death, until His coming again:

Take, eat, this is my Body which is given for you: Do this in remembrance of me.

Likewise after supper He took the Cup; and , when He had given thanks, He gave it to them, saying, Drink ye all of this: for this is my Blood of the New Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the remission of sins:

Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me. **Amen.**

Wherefore, O Lord and heavenly Father we Thy humble servants do celebrate and make here before Thy Divine Majesty, with these Thy holy gifts, the memorial Thy Son hath commanded us to make; having in remembrance His blessèd passion, and precious death, His mighty resurrection, and glorious ascension; rendering unto Thee most hearty thanks for the same, and looking for His coming again with power and great glory,

And we entirely desire Thy fatherly goodness mercifully to accept on high this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, beseeching Thee to grant, that by the merits and death of Thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in His blood, we and all Thy whole Church may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of His passion.

And we humbly beseech Thee, most merciful Father, to send down Thy holy and life-giving Spirit upon us and upon these Thy gifts, that the Bread which we break may be the communion of the Body of Christ, and the Cup which we bless may be the communion of His Blood; and grant, that all we who are partakers of this Holy communion may be fulfilled with Thy grace and heavenly benediction, and made one body in Thy Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ. **Amen.**



The Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, which was shed for thee, preserve thy body and soul unto everlasting life. Drink this is remembrance that Christ's Blood was shed for thee, and be thankful.




