JOY AND CHRISTMAS

A reflection on Luke 1: 26 - 55

Welcome to the Cathedral Church of Saint Thomas the Apostle. Thank you for joining us for our Christmas celebrations. Whether you are here every Sunday or you are just visiting this one time, we are blessed to have you with us, and we hope you will find something of God's love, hope, and peace in this sacred space.

In 1719, a year after the construction of St. Thomas' was completed, the renowned hymn writer Isaac Watts gifted the world the carol — 'Joy To The World', based on Psalm 98. It is hard to imagine a more joyful declaration than the announcement of a family expecting a child. Yet, there was no greater or more life-changing announcement than when Mary was told she would bear the Son of God. This birth was unlike any other, for God Himself would be the Father, and the child would be the God-man.

The passage in Luke 1:26-55 records this moment of divine joy. The events surrounding the announcement of Christ's birth are often referred to as the *Annunciation*—the foretelling of Jesus' arrival. But this was more than just a birth announcement; it was an announcement filled with pure joy. Let's dive deeper into the narrative:

There was a messenger: Archangel Gabriel's mission was clear—to bring joy, not only to Mary but to the entire world.

There was a message: God was about to step into human history, and joy would be the result.

An amazed response: Mary accepted the divine will, showing a deep trust in God's plan.

Mary's joy: In the final verses of Luke 1, we hear Mary's beautiful expression of joy and praise—the Magnificat. "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour..."

It is here that we see the true nature of the announcement—joy! Not just for Mary, but for the world. God was doing something marvellous in her life, and she rejoiced.

Christmas, then, is not merely a celebration of a birth. It is a celebration of joy—a joy that transcends time and space, a joy that is rooted in the birth of Jesus Christ, the Savior of the world. As we reflect on Luke 1:26-55, may our hearts join in Mary's joyful praise and the resounding chorus of "Joy to the World!"

Let this Christmas remind us of the joy that is found in Christ—the joy that began with an angel's announcement, echoed in Mary's song, and is proclaimed to the world today.

I hope and pray that you and your family and friends, will experience the joy of this special time of year and that you have a very happy Christmas and New Year.





The Lighting of the Christ Candle

The Advent wreath originally emerged as a devotional tool used in the home but eventually migrated into the church. It is a visual symbol that marks the progression of time in Advent.

On Christmas the Christ Candle is lit — as a symbol of the light of Christ, which cannot be held back by distance, which shines in each one of us, no matter where we are.

The Collect of the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ

The Collect is the prayer appointed for each Sunday & Festival that "collects" or captures the theme of the day or season of the Church year. It summarizes the attributes of God as revealed in the scriptures for the day.

The Old Testament Reading

Isaiah 9:2 - 7

This reading is typically from the Old Testament (Hebrew Scriptures) which Jesus knew and from which he often referred or quoted.

A reading from the prophesy of Isaiah.

THE people that walked in darkness have seen a great light: they that dwell in the land of the shadow of death, upon them hath the light shined. Thou hast multiplied the nation, Thou hast increased their joy: they joy before Thee according to the joy in harvest, and as men rejoice when they divide the spoil. For thou hast broken the yoke of his burden, and the staff of his shoulder, the rod of his oppressor as in the day of Midian. For all the armour of the armed man in the tumult and the garments rolled in blood, shall even be for burning, for fuel of fire.

For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon His shoulder: and His name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace. Of the increase of His government and peace there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon His kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgement and with justice from henceforth even for ever. The zeal of the Lord of hosts will perform this.

This reading, taken from the New Testament, is typically from a letter (epistle) to the early Church, the Acts of the Apostles, or the Revelation to John.

A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Hebrews.

GOD who at sundry times and in divers manners spake in time past unto the fathers by the prophets, hath in these last days spoken unto us by His Son, whom He hath appointed heir of all things, by whom also He made the worlds; who being the brightness of His glory, and the express image of His person, and upholding all things by the word of His power, when He had by Himself purged our sins, sat down on the right hand of the Majesty on high; being made so much better than the angels, as He hath by inheritance obtained a more excellent name than they. For unto which of the angels said He at any time,

Thou art my Son,

This day have I begotten Thee?

The term "Gradual" comes from the Latin for "step".

Traditionally, this was a psalm sung by a solo cantor on the steps of an elevated platform.

The 'gradual hymn' moves us toward the summit of the Liturgy of the Word — the reading of the Holy Gospel.

Gospel means "good news" — specifically the "good news of Jesus."

The Gospel Acclamation

The Gospel readings are taken from one of the four gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John), which depict the life, teachings, death, resurrection, and ascension of our Lord Jesus Christ. We stand for the Gospel reading to show the particular importance placed on Jesus' words and actions.

The same came for a witness, to bear witness of the light, that all men through him might believe. He was not that light, but was sent to bear witness of that light. But as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His name: which were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God. And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld His glory as of the only-begotten of the Father) full of grace and truth.

The Nicene Creed

The word "creed" comes from the Latin "credo" for "I believe." First formulated at the Council of Nicaea in 325 A.D. and confirmed in 381 A.D., the Nicene Creed is said at the Holy Eucharist and reflects what Christians believe regarding the relationship between the Father, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit: The Holy Trinity.

I BELIEVE in one God the Father Almighty,

maker of heaven and earth, and of all things visible and invisible:

And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God,

begotten of His Father before all worlds,

God of God,

light of light,

very God of very God,

begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father,

through whom all things were made:

Who for us men, and for our salvation came down from heaven,

and was incarnate by the Holy Spirit of the Virgin Mary,

and was made man, and was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate. He suffered and was buried,

and the third day He rose again according to the Scriptures,

and ascended into heaven,

and sitteth on the right hand of the Father.

And He shall come again with glory

to judge both the quick and the dead:

Whose Kingdom shall have no end.

And I believe in the Holy Spirit,

the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceedeth from the Father and the Son,

who with the Father and the Son together is worshipped and glorified,

who spake by the Prophets.

And I believe One Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church.

I acknowledge one baptism for the remission of sins.

And I look for the Resurrection of the dead,



The Eucharistic Prayer

In the Great Thanksgiving, we do what Jesus himself asked us to do: thank God and recall all that God has done for us in the life, death, and resurrection of Christ. The Great Thanksgiving, or Eucharistic Prayer, is a long prayer with four parts. Each of these four parts corresponds to a different action of Jesus at the Last Supper, where he took, blessed, broke, and gave bread and wine as sacraments of his body and blood. We begin the Great Thanksgiving with the Sursum Corda, meaning "Lift up your hearts."

Celebrant The Lord be with you;

All And also with you.

Lift up your hearts;

We lift them up to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to our Lord God;

It is right to give thanks and praise.

The Celebrant

IT is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times, and in all places, give thanks unto Thee, O Lord, Holy Father, Almighty, Everlasting God.

In this mystery of the Word made flesh you have caused his light to shine in our hearts, to give knowledge of your glory in the face of Jesus Christ. In him we see our God made visible and so are caught up in the love of the God we cannot see.

THEREFORE with Angels and Archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we laud and magnify Thy glorious name; evermore praising Thee, and saying,

The Breaking of Bread

We recall God's acts of salvation history. The presider says the "Words of Institution" that Jesus said at the Last Supper. At the Memorial Acclamation we remember Christ's death, resurrection, and promise to return at the end of the age. During the prayer, the Holy Spirit is invoked to bless and sanctify the gifts of bread and wine.

The Celebrant

HOLY in truth art Thou, and blessed in truth,
O Almighty God, our heavenly Father,
for that Thou of Thy tender mercy didst give
Thine only Son Jesus Christ to take our nature upon Him,
and to suffer death upon the Cross for our redemption;

Who, in the same night that He was betrayed, took Bread; and when He had given thanks to Thee, He brake it, and gave it to His disciples, saying,

Take, eat, this is my Body which is given for you: Do this in remembrance of me.

Likewise after supper He took the Cup; and , when He had given thanks, He gave it to them, saying, Drink ye all of this: for this is my Blood of the New Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the remission of sins:

Wherefore, O Lord and heavenly Father we Thy humble servants do celebrate and make here before Thy Divine Majesty, with these Thy holy gifts, the memorial Thy Son hath commanded us to make; having in remembrance His blessèd passion, and precious death, His mighty resurrection, and glorious ascension; rendering unto Thee most hearty thanks for the same, and looking for His coming again with power and great glory,

And we entirely desire Thy fatherly goodness mercifully to accept on high this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, beseeching Thee to grant, that by the merits and death of Thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in His blood, we and all Thy whole Church may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of His passion.

And we humbly beseech Thee, most merciful Father, to send down Thy holy and life-giving Spirit upon us and upon these Thy gifts, that the Bread which we break may be the communion of the Body of Christ, and the Cup which we bless may be the communion of His Blood; and grant, that all we who are partakers of this Holy communion may be fulfilled with Thy grace and heavenly benediction, and made one body in Thy Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ. **Amen.**






